Dogs in farm attack presumed euthanized

Injured animals from Loma Vista on the mend

The two dogs that killed three alpacas and seriously injured other animals Feb. 8 at Loma Vista Farm were presumably euthanized, said the nonprofit's board president.

"The dogs are no longer in a position to harm anyone or any animal again," said Julia Allen.

relaying information from a Solano County Animal Control report.

"The report does not clearly state the dogs were euthanized. One can draw that conclusion based on notes in the report," Allen said.

The dogs were surrendered by the owner the day after the attack and the owner had until Feb. 13 to change his mind, Allen. "However," she added, "they

would be subject to the Dangerous Dog procedures. It was noted on the report the dogs would be euthanized on Feb. 15 if the owners did not contact the Animal Control Office. No notes were made of the owners contacting animal control."

"Reading the report there are only a few options available to Animal Control — recommend adoption, make available for rescue or euthanize," Allen said. "The dogs had a prior history
